





Access to Medical and Mental Health Services

Purpose of the Standard: Address Needs and Protect Confidentiality

Medical Care

Prompt
 evaluation and
 treatment for
 physical injuries
 and other health
 concerns

Mental Health Support

Immediate and ongoing access to trauma informed services

Sexual Safety Measures

- Prioritize safety
- Protect
 Confidentiality
- Prevent retraumatization



Access to Medical and Mental Health Services

Purpose of the Standard:

Address Needs

- Ensure timely interventions
- Address immediate needs and prevent future incidents

Protect Confidentiality

- Limit access to information
- Informed Consent
- Build Trust



Access to Medical and Mental Health Services (cont.)



Follow-Up Requirement for Prior Sexual Victimization

Offer Follow-up Care:

- Medical and mental health within 14 days
- Use screening info to inform care and support

Info strictly limited to:

- Medical and mental health staff
- Relevant staff as necessary



Access to Medical and Mental Health Services (cont.)



Non-Institutional Prior Sexual Victimization

Informed Consent

 Medical and mental health must obtain before reporting

Exception

 Under 18, reporting may be required by law without consent.



Informed Consent



- Informed consent allows patients to make voluntary, well-informed decisions.
- Key elements of informed consent:

Voluntariness

Capacity

Documentation

Standard Variations



Standard Variations (Prisons and Jails)

Deviation Between Standards Provisions

- Prisons: Follow-up meetings offered for both prior victimization and perpetration within 14 days of intake.
- Jails: Follow-up meetings are required only for prior victimization; no obligation for those who have perpetrated abuse.



Standard Variations (Juveniles)

Deviation Between Standards Provisions

- Juvenile: Must offer follow-up meetings for both prior victimization and perpetration, similar to prison Standards.
- Lockups and community confinements: There is no comparable Standard for lockups and community confinement facilities.



Implementation



Implementation Strategies



Tailored follow-up: Ensure different protocols for prisons and juvenile facilities (victimization and perpetration) and jails (victimization only).

Discreet use of information: Ensure that information on past sexual abuse is only shared with relevant staff for safety and treatment purposes.

Documentation systems: Maintain secure and restricted records (e.g., forms, logs) to track compliance with follow-up services.



Practical Implementation

Strategies for effective screening.

Importance of timely follow-up meetings.

Training staff on confidentiality protocols.

Handling informed consent.





Risk screening tools:

- Use standardized question or indicators.
- Incorporate within the PREA Risk Assessment Instrument.
- Effectively identify individuals at risk of sexual victimization or abusiveness.





Privacy Measures

Conduct screening in private, confidential settings

Safeguard info

Encourage disclosures





Multidisciplinary Approach

Involve mental health in the screening process

Include medical for comprehensive evaluations

Provide assessment of risk





Training Staff

- Emphasize trauma informed approaches
- Teach techniques for asking sensitive questions



Informed Consent

- Language: Use clear and simple language to explain informed consent, ensuring that the individual fully understands the process.
- Cultural sensitivity: Train staff to address cultural differences that may affect how people in custody understand and provide consent.





Informed Consent (cont.)

Written & Verbal Consent

- Medical and mental health services
- People in custody have the opportunity to ask questions

Documentation

- Maintain detailed records
- Include questions asked and responses given
- Transparency
- Document consent for minors

Challenges



Access to Medical and Mental Health Services

Access to Medical and Mental Health Services

Challenges

- Track individuals with prior victimization or perpetration to ensure followup care within 14 days.
- Document follow-up care/needs and refusals offers.
- Limit disclosure of information within the facility.



Promising Practices



Promising Practices



- Develop policies to document whether accept or decline follow-up care.
- Prioritize offering follow-up meetings as soon as possible, even before the 14-day deadline.
- Implement reliable tracking and communication systems between intake and medical and mental health units.



Audit Considerations



Audit Tools that Address Compliance



PAQ (Pre-Audit Questionnaire):

 Tracks the percent of incarcerated people who disclosed prior victimization and received a follow-up meeting with medical or mental health staff in the past 12 months.

ACT (Audit Compliance Tool):

 Aids in verifying facility adherence to PREA Standards, specifically regarding timely access to mental health services, informed consent, and protection of information.



Audit Considerations



Policy(ies):

 governing the facility response to follow-up meeting(s) and other services with a medical and/or mental health practitioner, protection of information and informed consent.

Audit Considerations



Interviews:

 Auditors will interview confined people and staff to verify that followup care was offered within 14 days of intake and that the facility adhered to confidentiality protocols.



Site Review Considerations



- Physical storage of records auditors will:
 - Observe secured areas for hard copy records.
- Electronic safeguards auditors will:
 - Confirm secure electronic storage.
 - Role-based access limited to authorized personnel.



Recap of Key Points

- Ensures that immediate medical and mental health needs are addressed.
- Unaddressed medical and mental health needs may lead to negative impacts on the safety of all individuals in the facility.
- Proactive measures can decrease the likelihood of future sexual abuse incidents.



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Access to Medical and Mental Health Services (cont.)



Recap of Key Points

- Accessibility to medical and mental health services increases confidence in the facility's treatment systems among people in confinement.
- Improves overall sexual safety culture.
- Informed consent.




